Remembrance Day

It is observed on November 11th to recall the end of World War I on that day in 1918. The day was specifically dedicated by King George V, on November 7th, 1919, for observance of members of the armed forces who were killed during war. The first Remembrance Day was conducted in 1919 throughout the British Commonwealth. Originally called Armistice Day, it commemorated the end of hostilities the previous year. It came to symbolize the end of the war and provided an opportunity to remember those who had died. After the end of the Second World War in 1945, Armistice Day became Remembrance Day and now includes all those who had fallen in the two World Wars, Korea, Afghanistan, and other Peacekeeping conflicts.

Why Remember?

We remember the sacrifice of thousands of Canadians who died for us, for our freedom, for Canada. By remembering their service and their sacrifice, we recognize the tradition of freedom these men and women fought to preserve. They believed that their actions in the present would make a significant difference for the future and it is up to us to ensure that their dream of peace is realized. On Remembrance Day, we acknowledge the courage and sacrifice of those who served their country.

Two Minute Silence

On the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month in 1918, the guns of Europe fell silent. After four years of the most bitter and devastating fighting, the Great War was finally over. Since then, at 11:00 A.M. throughout the Country, a two minute silence is observed at war memorials, cenotaphs and religious services. As we pause and bow our heads, we remember those brave men and women who courageously volunteered for the cause of freedom and peace.

Why Beverly Cenotaph?

The Beverly Cenotaph is Edmonton's oldest, where for 102 years, Edmonton communities have been attending the outdoor memorial to honor our past and present Veterans. We pause from our fast paced lives to be truly thankful for those who fought for our freedom. Thirty to forty-five minutes outdoors is a small price for paying respect to our Veterans and Serving Members of our Armed Forces.
